To repeat these enhanced learning outcomes for A.S. in Criminal Justice majors KCC will work closely with John Jay enrollment management and student development personnel to (1) identify and recruit students into KCC's program who have attended John Jay's associate degree program and (2) enroll first-time freshmen Criminal Justice majors into KCC's learning communities program with the goal of creating and sustaining a cohort of future transfers to John Jay who are prepared to succeed.

IV. Curriculum

The proposed curriculum includes five courses in the major. Five have emerged from the John Jay Educational Partnership Initiative as among the all majors should have for a Criminal Justice degree. For a KCC Associate Degree in Criminal Justice, majors will take: *Introduction to Criminal Justice, Criminology and Punishment* at KCC), *Constitutional Law* and *The American Judiciary* (at KCC). Following the Educational Partnership curriculum design, *Introduction to Criminal Justice* and *Criminology* will be required in the first year as they are pre-requisite for the other major courses to be taken in the second year.

Constitutional Law and *The American Legal System* are subject to two courses which are suggested for the first semester of the junior year. Based on discussions with John Jay professor Todd Clear, KCC proposes that these two courses in our A.S. program, thereby giving our students a solid nine-credit foundation in law which will prepare them well for the concentration in Law and Due Process leading to the B.A. at John Jay. *Constitutional Law* will be re-designed to emphasize procedural and some issues and the reading of cases. While *The American Legal System* is already equivalent to John Jay's *The American Judiciary*, it will also undergo careful and some

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V. Faculty

Professors Voorhes and Vernon are full-time members of the Department of History, Criminal Justice and Administration. They have taught *Introduction to Criminal Justice* for several years. Professor Dunn is a part-time faculty member at Kingsborough, he is an advisor to the student Council for the City of Mobile.

Professor Mogensen has a Ph.D. in Political Science from the University of Alaska. He has published in *Journal of Criminal Justice* and *Journal of Law and Society*. He has led field trips to the New York State Criminal Justice Academy. He is the author of *The Encyclopedia of American Criminal Justice*.

Several adjunct faculty members have strong backgrounds in the field of criminal justice. Paul Odems is a former court clerk and has published articles on community crime control. Dr. Klein is a domestic violence expert.

Kingsborough is planning to offer a Criminal Justice program. Professors Dunn and Mogensen will be needed to teach the initial stages of the program. As a result of the Department's search for a new full-time faculty member in criminal justice, the College plans to hire a new full-time faculty member who will teach and sustain the program.
